THE BIG FAIR. Arrangements are Now Completed for Woonsocket's Gala Week.

The program for the three days' fair of the Woonsocket Agricultural Society this week has been perfected, and there is no doubt but that it will prove attractive and call out a very liberal patronage.

The list of fast horses, too, is the largest ever called together in the State, excepting one or two meetings in Providence, and the announced attempt of a Woonsocket horse—Billy Frazier—to beat the track record on Thursday afternoon is attracting widespread attention.

The whippet races, with the fastest dogs in America, will be given every afternoon and evening.

The wonderful Japs will give a stage performance, lasting an hour and a half, every afternoon and evening.

The athletic events on Wednesday evening, under the auspices of St. Andrew's Brotherhood, are alone one of the most notable attractions ever witnessed in the State, and there will be great interest in the contests by noted cracks.

The harvest festival and grand illumination on Wednesday evening, and a competitive drill by famous French military organizations Thursday night are also special features that will doubtless fill the park.
